**Presentations:** Finalists pitch their ideas.

**Voting:** Members vote to select that year's funded project.

**Impact:** The winning project is brought to life — and members receive updates along the way.



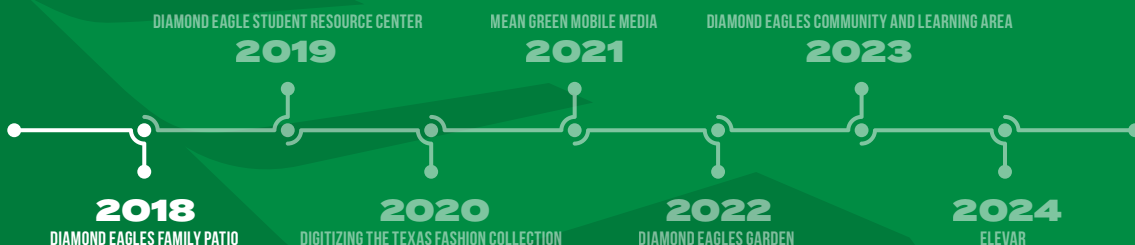

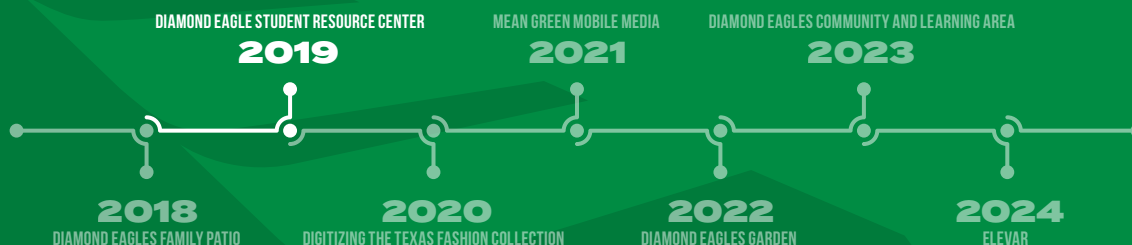

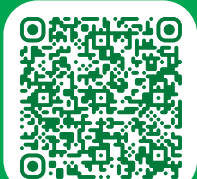
FORMERLY STUDENTS OF NEED: SUIT UP, FUEL UP, CAP UP



Since consolidating the UNT Food Pantry presented by Kroger, the Mean Green Gowns for Grads Program and the Suit Up Closet into one area, each program has expanded significantly. More than 3,500 individual students use the food pantry per year, and Kroger continues to support through a \$250,000 gift over five years. Gowns for Grads has served more than 300 students per year, and the Suit Up closet served just over 200 students this past year.

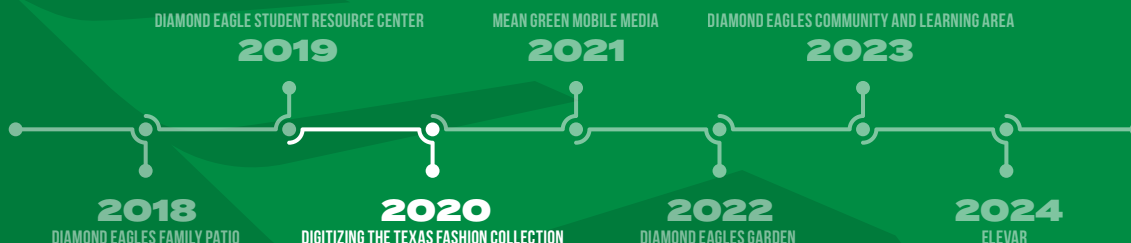
## DIGITIZING THE TEXAS FASHION COLLECTION



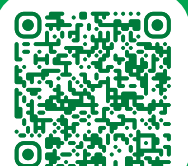

Since receiving Diamond Eagles support, the Texas Fashion Collection’s digitization project has taken off and soared! The team — consisting almost entirely of UNT students — has digitized over 10,000 world-class garments and accessories since 2020. Web traffic to our online records has more than doubled in this time, providing critical access to researchers and scholars who feature images of our UNT treasures in their projects and publications.



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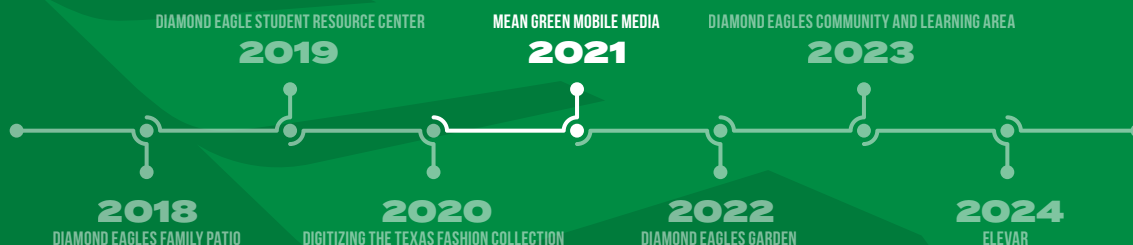

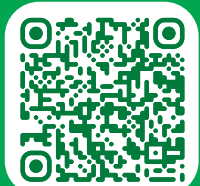
## MEAN GREEN MOBILE MEDIA

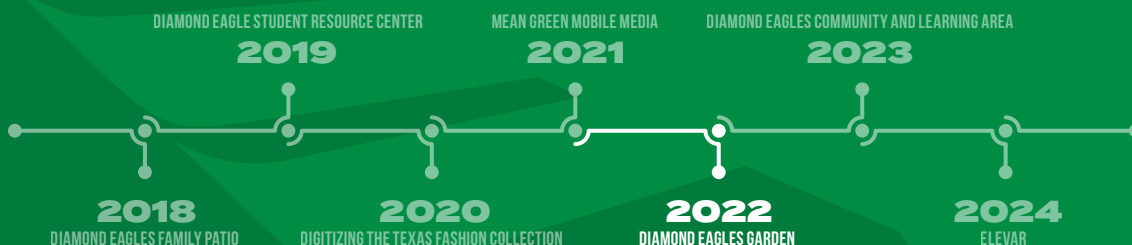


## DIAMOND EAGLES GARDEN AT MEAN GREEN ACRES

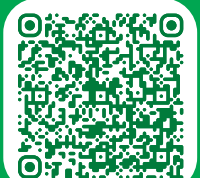

The Diamond Eagles Garden at Mean Green Acres Hydroponic Farm is up and running, now harvesting 2.5 acres of produce per week for the UNT dining halls. Additionally, the hydroponic farm is experimenting with growing some new crop items, such as radishes and carrots. The Diamond Eagles Garden is also a feature of the campus tours for prospective students, and the farm was recently featured in the Menus of Change Conference and the NACAS South Conference.

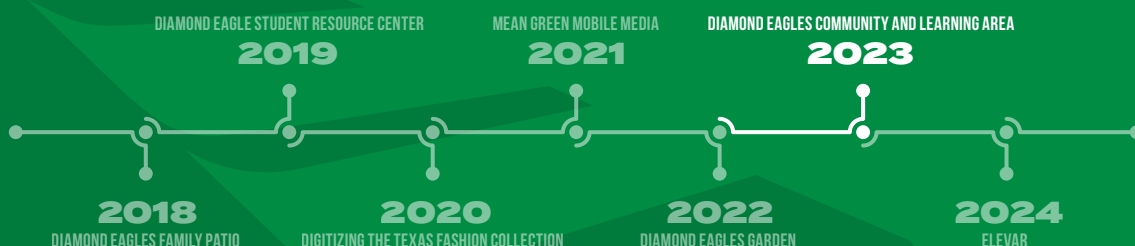
## DIAMOND EAGLES COMMUNITY AND LEARNING AREA AT THE UNT POLLINATIVE PRAIRIE



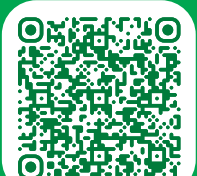

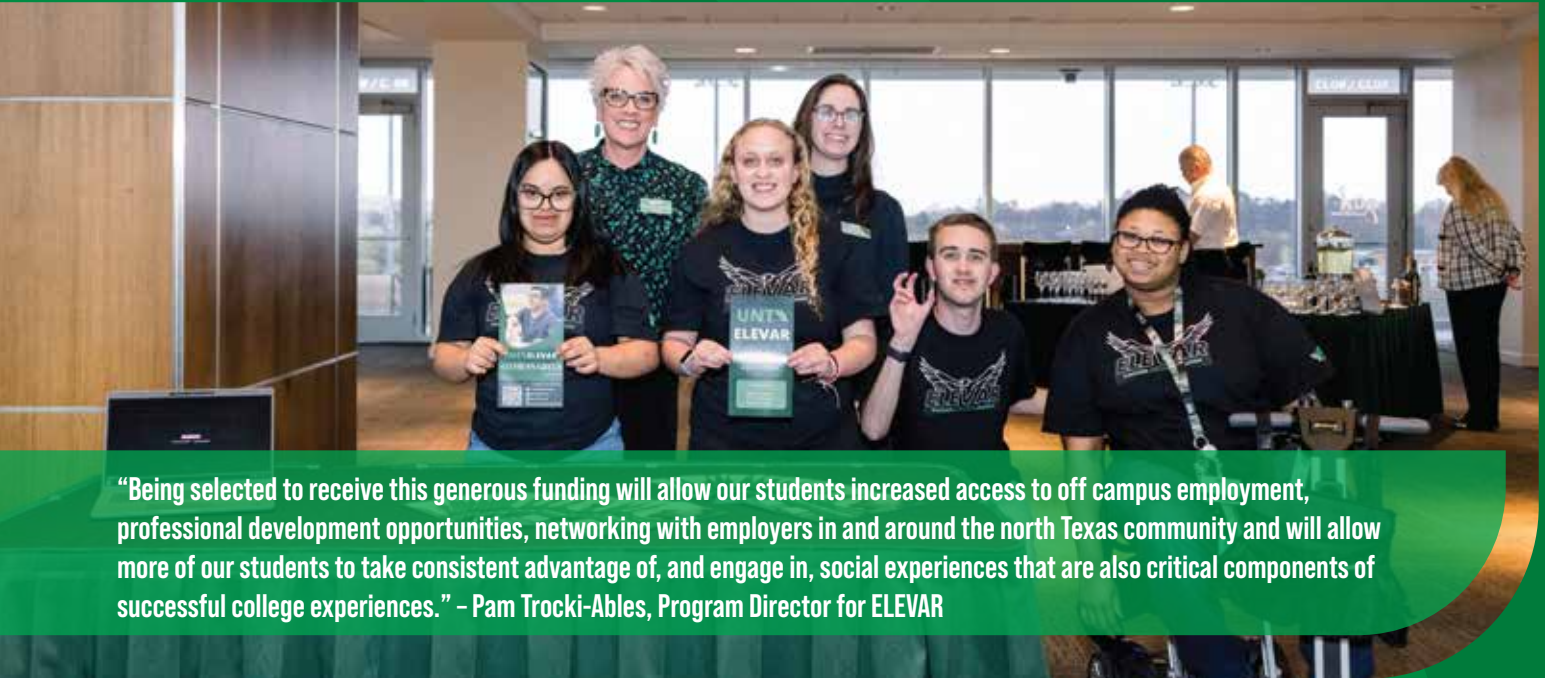

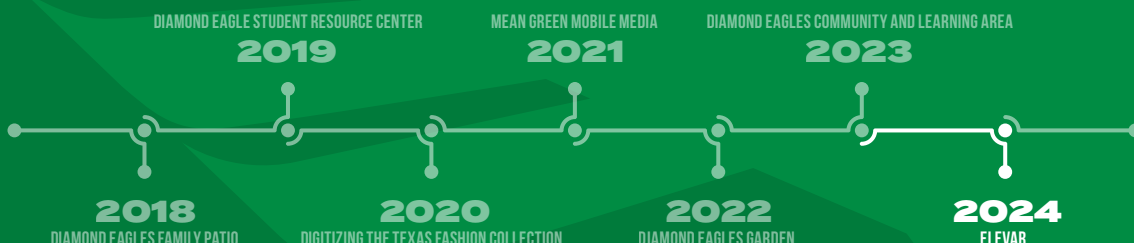


## UNT ELEVAR

ELEVAR at UNT is a four-year inclusive postsecondary education program for students with intellectual disabilities. The program’s vision is to empower young adults with intellectual disabilities who wish to continue postsecondary education to become self-determined, independent and healthy adults readied for integrated competitive employment. The Diamond Eagles Society funds received allowed ELEVAR to purchase an accessible 10 passenger van, along with insurance, and has been critical to removing transportation barriers for students with intellectual disabilities both on and off campus.
